W!se Teacher Certification in Personal Finance Available at WBEA 2017

W!se developed a Financial Literacy Teacher Certification Program in 2008. Teachers prepare for the assessment through self-guided study using the W!se Certification in Personal Finance Manual. After preparation teachers take the W!se Teacher Certification in Personal Finance Test. Testers have 1 hour and 15 minutes to complete the comprehensive 75 multiple-choice question assessment. The test evaluates instructor's knowledge on topics that are aligned to state & national standards.

Teachers who pass the test earn a Certification in Personal Finance (CPF). The CPF demonstrates proficiency in personal finance. Certified teachers are subsequently encouraged to enroll their schools in the W!se Financial Literacy Certification Program for students.

The W!se Teacher Certification in Personal Finance Test will be offered during the 2017 WBEA Conference in Bozeman Montana. Testers MUST bring a personal WIFI enabled device (laptop, iPad, Chromebook...) to test upon. The cost of testing is \$50. To participate teachers must register prior to the conference. MT Business Educators Attend Jump\$tart National Educators Conference on Financial Literacy Five of Montana's Business Educators attended the Jump\$tart Coalition's 8th Annual National Educator Conference in Dallas. The National Educator Conference, held November 5-7, provides attendees the opportunity to see, learn about, and try educational resources that can be immediately integrated into current lesson plans.

The <u>Jump\$tart Coalition National Educator Conference</u> is the only national conference for classroom teachers dedicated to personal finance education in the classroom. Each year, the conference provides PreK-12 educators with financial education resources, personal and professional development, access to a nation-wide network of colleagues, and general support for financial education.

Additionally, three of the attendees received financial support through national Jump\$tart partners and Montana's state-level coalition, the Montana Financial Education Coalition. Doug Andersen received one of 20 \$425 scholarships from NextGen Personal Finance, Steven Klimkiewicz was awarded VISA Innovative Educators \$1000 scholarship to cover conference registration and travel, and Jody Sandru was a recipient of one of two \$100 scholarships from the Montana Financial Education Coalition (mtmfec.org).

<u>Superintendent Juneau Asks Montanans For Their Input On The Every Student Succeeds Act</u> Superintendent of Public Instruction Denise Juneau has released Montana's draft state plan for implementing the *Every Student Succeeds Act* or ESSA. Juneau sent one copy to the governor for his review, and posted another copy <u>HERE</u> for public comment.

"It's exciting that Montanans now have a seat at the table in determining what our public schools should emphasize, and how we can support students and educators grow," Superintendent Juneau said. "The last thing I want to see in Montana is No Child Left Behind 2.0, which is why we're working to include the voices of educators, parents, and school leaders in developing Montana's state plan."

On December 10, 2015, President Obama signed into law the *Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)*, reauthorizing the Elementary/Secondary Education Act of 1965. States have been operating under the guidance of the *No Child Left Behind (NCLB)* reauthorization since 2007. ESSA redirects former NCLB requirements in giving states the ability to develop their own accountability plans. ESSA also places a stronger emphasis on child wellbeing and recognizes there are many ways to measure performance.

Montana's state plan will continue to build on the successes of our public schools by continuing to raise graduation rates, improve teaching, learning and student achievement, identify and support schools of greatest need, and improve non-academic student outcomes in all of Montana's public schools.

In March, Superintendent Juneau <u>appointed a group</u> of educators, parents and school leaders from across the state to begin the work of developing Montana's state plan. The group has met four times.

Save the Date – Montana Economics Challenge 2017

The Helena Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis will host the 22nd Annual Montana Economics Challenge on Monday, March 6, 2017 in Helena at the Great Northern Hotel.

The Economics Challenge is a one-day contest in which secondary students compete as team members and as individuals for prizes based on their knowledge of economics. The National Competition held in New York City will feature winning teams from four regional economics challenges. One of the four regional competitions, The Heartland Region, is held in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Winning teams from eight other states will meet to determine which teams advance to the national event.

During the first three rounds of competition, students are tested in four areas: macroeconomics, microeconomics, current events/economic applications and international economics. The final round is a timed quiz-bowl play-off between the top two teams in each of two divisions. The first team to answer a majority of the questions wins.

Fun Facts and Trivia

Luxembourg is a small European country, surrounded by Belgium, France and Germany.

Luxembourg was founded in 963AD as the County of Luxembourg by Sigefroid, Count of the Ardennes, who built a fort on the site; the ancient Saxon name Lucilinburhuc ('little fortress') symbolized its strategic position. Over the years, the little fort became a major fortress.

Luxembourg is the only Grand Duchy in the world. After the defeat of Napoleon in 1815, the Congress of Vienna made Luxembourg into a Grand Duchy, a state or territory ruled by a grand duke or duchess. The country's full name is the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg.

The present Grand Duke of Luxembourg is Crown Prince Henri who assumed the throne in October 2000.

Luxembourg has the highest GDP per capita in the world and its GDP is almost three times the average GPD of the European Union.

The only country with a higher Gross Domestic Product per capita than Luxembourg is Qatar.

The education system of Luxembourg is trilingual; students in primary schools are taught in Luxembourgish in the initial stage before changing to German, whereas in the secondary schools lectures are delivered in French.

Luxembourg is one of the founder-members of NATO, the Western European Union, the European Union, the United Nations and the Benelux. It is the bench of many institutions and agencies of the EU.

Luxembourg It is the least populated country amongst all the member countries of European Union and is the 20th smallest country of the 194 independent nations of the world.

When giving someone flowers in Luxembourg it is customary to give an odd number, but not 13.

Luxembourg has only won two medals at the Summer Olympics and two at the Winter Olympics.

Luxembourg's only gold medal was for the 1,500 meters at the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki, won by Josy Barthel, who later became a government minister.

Luxembourg is one of the safest countries in the world. According to a UN survey, you have less chance of being shot in Luxembourg than in any other country in the world. There are around 1,300 police and just two jails in Luxembourg.

Luxembourg has the highest minimum wage in the EU—paying workers a minimum of \$2,167 per month.
