Tomorrow, November 1, is DEADLINE to Check/Verify/Correct Course & Enrollment Info in TEAMS

Thursday, November 1 is the deadline for schools to enter data in OPI's TEAMS System (Terms of Employment, Accreditation, and Master Schedule). Data from TEAMS pertaining to Career and Technical Education courses, student enrollments, and teacher certification is used for Carl Perkins accountability reporting and factors that determine the State CTE (State VoEd) allocations.

Additionally, as of the 2017-2018 school year, the data is also used to verify and approve Montana Career Pathways (formerly Big Sky Pathways).

Therefore, it is imperative the information submitted is complete and accurate.

Any high school district planning to apply for Carl Perkins and/or State CTE (State VoEd) funding for next year (2019-2020) should submit the additional data in TEAMS for all current CTE programs at their high school.

When reviewing the data for your courses within the TEAMS System, please verify the following information is correct—

--Name of teacher(s) for courses

--All current courses being taught for the 2018-2019 school year are listed and the correct course title is listed under for the District Course Title

--All courses listed are aligned to the correct Course Code & Title

--Number of students enrolled and breakdown of males and females

- --Term Type for courses (Semester, Full Year, Quarter, etc.)
- --Class Minutes (the minutes of instruction for each individual course per the term type)

--If an extended contract is identified along with the number of days of the contract

If you need a listing of the OPI Course Codes and Descriptions, a <u>Reference Manual for Business & Marketing Education</u> can be downloaded from the Business Education page of the OPI website at <u>opi.mt.gov/Educators/Teaching-Learning/Career-Technical-Education/Business-Education</u>.

All data should be reviewed, verified, and corrected by November 1. After this date, TEAMS will close for new data entries.

CTE U.S. Presidential Scholars Program—Nominate Your Seniors by November 16

The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was established in 1964, by executive order of the President, to recognize and honor some of our nation's most distinguished graduating high school seniors. In 1979, the program was extended to recognize students who demonstrate exceptional talent in the visual, creative and performing arts.

In 2015, the program was again extended to recognize students who demonstrate ability and accomplishment in career and technical education fields. Each year, up to 161 students are named as Presidential Scholars, one of the nation's highest honors for high school students.

All high school seniors that are CTE Concentrators (3 Credits or more of CTE) and graduating between January and June of 2018, who are U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents and who attend public, parochial, or independent schools, as well as those who are home-schooled, are eligible.

The candidates will go through the application process, and as in the past, the 2019 U.S. Presidential Scholars will be selected by the Commission on Presidential Scholars and receive the Presidential Scholars Medallion at a ceremony in their honor in Washington, DC.

Nominations of Montana CTE students for the 2018 CTE U.S. Presidential Scholars Program are due November 16, 2018.

The NCWIT Award for Aspirations in Computing (<u>aspirations.org/participate/high-school</u>) is for young women with aspirations and achievements in technology and computing.

This year will be the seventh year that there also will be a Montana contest for Montana girls. The time to submit applications is September 1-November 5 and the application is found at <u>www.aspirations.org/participate/high-school</u>.

In a global economy, gender diversity in IT means a larger and more competitive workforce; in a world dependent on innovation, it means the ability to design technology that is as broad and creative as the people it serves. We and our partners believe that diversity in innovation benefits all and are committed to doing our part to encourage young women in our area to choose careers in computing and IT.

By generating visibility for capable technical young women, the NCWIT Award for Aspirations in Computing encourages their continued interest in computing, attracts the attention and support of educational and corporate institutions, and emphasizes at a personal level the importance of women's participation in computing.

There are many qualified high school girls that would apply if they just had a little push from a leader like you.

Any interested female high school student would need to fill in the on-line application, and get a parent and a school official to approve it to be entered into both the national and Montana contests.

The Montana contest has had winners from high schools in Absarokee, Anaconda, Arlee, Beaverhead, Bozeman, Bozeman Petra, Broadwater, Butte, Cascade, Cut Bank, Great Falls High, Helena Capital, Helena High, Jefferson High, Libby, Missoula Big Sky, Missoula Hellgate, Missoula Sentinel, Noxon, Park County, Seeley-Swan, Simms, and Whitefish High Schools.

We hope your school will be represented on the winners list this year, but girls have to apply.

We are looking forward to recognizing Montana's talent, and hope that you would encourage the young women that you know to apply. Sometimes all they need is a little encouragement and <u>you</u> are the person to provide that.

Fall 2018 CTE Data Collection—Time to Report Post-Graduation Status of CTE Concentrators for Perkins

The Fall 2018 CTE Data Collection begins on October 1 and ends December 31, 2018. The Fall CTE Data Collection is a follow up to last year's Spring CTE Data Collection. Students identified as CTE Concentrators last year (2017-2018) and graduated in the spring of 2018 should be contacted between October 1 and December 31 and asked their current post-graduation status.

After contact, the appropriate post-graduation status code must be entered into the AIM/Infinite Campus data system for each CTE Concentrator.

All high schools that received funding from the Carl D. Perkins federal grant program in 2017-2018 are required to complete this fall follow up collection to maintain their eligibility to receive Perkins funding.

Instructions for completing the Fall CTE Data Collection—called the 'Quick Reference Guide' for the Fall CTE Data Collection—are located in two places on the OPI website: on the AIM web page listed in AIM User Guides and also on the CTE web page under the 'Data Collections' tab.

PLEASE NOTE: Be sure to verify the list of CTE Concentrators from what your district submitted last spring. Any additions, corrections, or changes to the list of CTE Concentrators must be made no later than November 15, 2018, to be accurately reflected in federal reporting and used to compute Perkins Performance Indicators for your school.

Prizes include 10 National Grand Prize Winners at \$5,000 each and 10 Honorable Mention Award winners at \$500 each.

Fun Facts and Trivia

Istanbul is the largest and most populous city in Turkey.

Recent evidence suggests that people have lived in Istanbul for 8500 years.

Istanbul was called Byzantium by Megarian colonists in 660 BC, then when the Roman Emperor Constantine the Great made it the capital of the Eastern Roman Empire, it took the name of Constantinople. In 1930, it was officially renamed Istanbul, but as the people continued to call it Constantinople, the Turkish post office didn't deliver any mail addressed to Constantinople for many years just to ensure that people use the new name.

When Roman Emperor Constantine the Great made the city the capital of the Eastern Roman Empire in 330 AD, he decided to build it on seven hills just like Rome

Istanbul is the only city in the world that's half in Asia and half in Europe; the Bosporus strait which divides the two continents passes through Istanbul and is the link between Sea of Marmara and the Black Sea.

Leonardo da Vinci envisioned a bridge over the Bosphorus, 471 years before the first one was built.

At the moment there are two suspension bridges on the Bosphorus Strait connecting Europe to Asia. The third one is under construction.

Istanbul currently has three international airports—one on the Europe side and one on the Asia side—with a third which just opened October 29, 2018.

Istanbul's newest airport, named Istanbul Airport, is the world's biggest airport and will employing 1.5 million people and serving 200 million passengers yearly when fully operational.

Despite being the capital of many great ancient empires—Byzantine, Roman, and Ottoman—Istanbul is not the modern day capital of Turkey. The capital of Turkey is Ankara.

The Hagia Sophia in Istanbul stands as a great historical museum now, but it was built as an Orthodox cathedral in 537 CE and converted to a mosque under the Ottoman rule after 1453. The Hagia Sophia is the second most visited museum in Turkey and attracts over 3 million tourists every year.

Another interesting fact about Hagia Sophia is that it was the largest church in the world for about 900 years until the Seville Cathedral of Spain was completed in 1520.

In operation since 1461, the Grand Bazaar in Istanbul is one of the oldest and largest shielded markets in the world and is a shopper's paradise with over 5,000 shops, 60 streets, and attracts over 300,000 visitors daily.

You may think that tulips originated from Netherlands, but the first tulip bulbs were sent from the Ottoman Empire in Istanbul to Vienna in 1554, and they were further distributed to Netherlands.

Built in 1875, Istanbul has the third oldest subway system in the world; only the London tube (1863) and New York subway system (1868) are older.

While the rest of Europe had none, Istanbul had 1400 toilets across the city during the times of Ottoman Empire.

Agatha Christie wrote the famous murder mystery novel "Murder on the Orient Express" in Pera Palas Hotel in Istanbul. The Orient Express train used to travel between Paris and Constantinople (Istanbul) from 1883 to 1977.

Princes' Islands, located just off the coast of Istanbul are a chain of nine small islands that run on horses and carts only as as all motorized vehicles are banned on the islands.

Tea has become a national drink only recently; before that, it was Turkish coffee but when it became expensive and tea leaves could be grown in the Black Sea region, tea took its place.
