Final State CTE/VoEd Allocations Posted; Funds Deposited to County Treasurers Friday, November 1

The final allocations for 2020 State CTE/VoEd funding are now posted on the CTE page of the OPI website at http://opi.mt.gov/Educators/Teaching-Learning/Career-Technical-Education-CTE/State-VoEd. Funds for the 2019-2020 school year are posted in the 2020 Final VoEd Payment Detail by Legal Entity report.

The State CTE/VoEd funding final allocations are generated based on the data entered into TEAMS (Terms of Employment, Accreditation, and Master Schedule) for the prior 2018-2019 school year and national membership numbers of Montana's sponsored Career & Technical Student Organizations.

The CTE tab in TEAMS was made available last April and districts were asked to complete a few additional items on the tab and review the details carefully to make sure the data was accurate.

The 2019-2020 State CTE/VoEd Funding allocations were provided to country treasurers on November 1 and should be available for districts.

Registration Now Open for 2020 Montana High School Mock Trial Competition Sponsored by Montana Bar Association

Through participation in the Montana High School Mock Trial Competition, students from all over Montana have a hands-on opportunity to examine the legal process and current legal issues, engage with local attorneys and the judicial branch of government, and develop important critical thinking, presentation, public speaking, and teamwork skills.

Students play the roles of attorneys, witnesses, timekeepers, and courtroom artists (optional). Students prepare both sides of the case. A student may be an attorney for one side and a witness for the other, or an attorney for both sides, or a witness for both sides. Timekeepers keep the competition rounds on schedule. Courtroom artists provide a visual record of the proceedings.

Teachers help recruit team members, handle team logistics, assist with fundraising, and partner with attorney coaches to prepare students for the competition.

Attorneys provide a lawyer's perspective on the case materials and work with the teams to learn trial practice skills and develop trial strategies.

Fun Facts and Trivia

The imbe is a small, bright orange, oblong fruit that is native to Africa

Imbe thrives on deep and sandy soils but also can tolerate salty soil, so they can grow near the ocean.

The fruits have a watery pulp, taste sweet, having a flavor much like that of the apricot, but are very acidic, and contain latex.

An antibacterial component has been found in the leaves of the imbe fruit.

The bark and root of the imbe tree can be used to treat meningitis, tuberculosis, and cancer.

Imbe can be eaten raw, crushed into a drink, seeded and dried, and cooked into desserts.

Imbe trees can be grown in the southern third of the US and along the west coast.

In the US, Florida is main growing area of imbe fruit.

Imbe trees usually fruits between July and August with the fruit ripening to a bright orange in August and is gone within two weeks.

The skin is quite tender, so shipping this fruit is not practical.

The evergreen-like imbe tree usually has one large trunk with other thick branches stemming from it, putting the fruit closer to the ground than if they grew off just the main trunk

The imbe tree's unique appearance makes it a popular choice in landscaping; in fact, imbe trees can be found at Mozambique's capitol and near Victoria Falls in Zambia and Zimbabwe.

Imbe fruits can be found in the markets between the months of June and October, but ripen mostly during the month of August.
