Wrapping Up the WBEA 2022 Conference and Saving the Date for 2023

The <u>Western Business Education Association</u> (WBEA) 2022 Conference was held this past weekend, February 17-20, in Seattle at the Seattle Marriott Waterfront. The conference included a variety of breakout sessions, the Professional Development Leadership Training, meetings of various committees, and the yearly WBEA awards program.

During the conference, the WBEA Executive Board meeting is held to address the business of the regional association. Jessica Goosen (Charles M. Russell High School) and David Powell (Bainville High School) represented the Montana Business Education Association (MBEA) on the WBEA Executive Board. Montana had two other members on the WBEA Executive Board with Mandy Wichman (Hobson High School) serving as the WBEA Secretary and Eric Swenson (Office of Public Instruction) as the WBEA President-elect.

One of the items of business during the WBEA Executive Board meeting is the election of the 2022-2023 officers and Mandy Wichman was elected to continue serving as the WBEA Secretary and will serve a two-year term. Additionally, Eric Swenson will move up to be the WBEA President for 2022-2023. Other WBEA business included the appointment of three new WBEA Committee Directors—Legislative, Membership, and Newsletter—and MBEA member and Montana ACTE Executive Director Mark Branger (Huntley Project High School) accepted the appointment to serve as the WBEA Legislative Liaison. Terms of office will run July 1, 2022-June 30, 2023.

Terri Norman (Capital High School) also attended in the WBEA 2022 Conference and joined Jessica and David in participating in the WBEA Professional Development Leadership Training (PDLT). The PDLT is an opportunity to network, energize, and develop leadership skills. The workshop is sponsored by WBEA and state associations. This year's PDLT workshop encompasses the Presidents-elect workshop, Membership Directors workshop, and leadership training. Apply Now for the Montana Quality Educator Loan Assistance Program

Through House Bill 211, the 2019 Montana legislature renewed the quality educator <u>student loan</u> <u>assistance</u> program as a recruitment and retention aid for rural schools. The Office of Public Instruction is responsible for administering the program. Applications for the <u>Montana Quality Educator Loan</u> Assistance Program will be accepted from February 1-March 31, 2022.

Newly hired quality educators who teach or work in a subject that has been identified as a "critical quality educator shortage area" at an "impacted school" are eligible to receive state paid loan assistance for up to four years, so long as they remain a full-time employee at an impacted school.

The <u>program</u> provides for up to \$3,000 of state-funded loan repayment at the end of the first year of teaching, up to \$4,000 at the end of the second year, and up to \$5,000 at the end of the third year. In addition, the school district has the option to offer up to \$5,000 at the end of the fourth year, but this is entirely a local decision.

Fun Facts & Trivia

Trivial Pursuit was created on December 15, 1979, by Chris Haney and Scott Abbott, two Canadian newspaper editors

Haney and Abbott developed the game while playing a game of Scrabble.

The design of the game board is based off of a ship's wheel—six separate spokes leading to the center or winner's circle.

The artwork for the game was by 18-year-old Michael Wurstlin who was unemployed at the time and took the job because his unemployment insurance had run out.

Wurstlin chose to invest in five shares of stock and earned enough money to start Wurstlingroup, a successful marketing company based in Toronto.

The first ever edition of *Trivial Pursuit*, *Trivial Pursuit*: *Master Game Genus Edition*, came out in 1981.

Trivial Pursuit hit the public in 1981 with one game costing around \$74 to make and it was only sold for \$15.

The game did not start to make a profit until it was licensed to Selchow and Righter in 1983.

Over fifty special editions of *Trivial Pursuit* have been made.

Some of the well known ones include Star Wars Classic Trilogy Collector's Edition, Lord of the Rings Movie Trilogy Edition, The Rolling Stones Edition, Power Rangers 20th Anniversary Edition, Baby Boomer Edition, *Trivial Pursuit Mini Pack: Hollywood Flicks*, *Trivial Pursuit: Country Music*

The original game had 6,000 questions printed on 1,000 cards.

Haney and Abbott were taken to court by Fred Worth in 1984 over the fact that they had copied Worth's published trivia books.

The judge dismissed the case ruling that trivia was not able to be copyrighted.

Trivial Pursuit has made over \$2 billion.

Trivial Pursuit X Game, otherwise known as "the one with the stamp"., is an adult version of Trivial Pursuit that comes with an ink stamper in the form of an "X."

The purpose of the stamp in the game is to eliminate people.

If you get a question wrong, you get a stamp on your forehead—get five stamps and you're out.

Over 100 million copies of the game have been sold in 26 countries in over 17 different languages.

Trivial Pursuit has come out with many Spanish versions of the game.

Notably, Spain has its very own *Genus Edition*.

Other Spanish editions include Edicion Olympica (Olympic Edition) and Edicion Familia (Family Edition).

Other European countries, such as France and Germany, have their own *Trivial Pursuit* games too.

The game is even popular in countries like Russia and Poland.

Trivial Pursuit Glass Edition is a stunning piece of decor for your living room or library and is an actual Trivial Pursuit game.

The special edition is *Trivial Pursuit's Genus* printed on glass and comes with all the game components, including translucent pies and wedges.

It includes 1,800 questions in the set too, so you can play a few rounds with your friends.

*Trivial Pursuit Unhinged*_is a *Trivial Pursuit* video game for Xbox.

The game offers classic *Trivial Pursuit* gameplay on your TV with questions read from real stars.

The game has three modes: Classic, Flash, and Unhinged.

In Unhinged mode, you can earn bonus points, steal wedges, and bet on other players' performance.
