Summer 2022 Computer Science Professional Development for Montana's K12 Teachers

The Montana State University, Montana Tech, Salish Kootenai College, and the University of Montana have teamed up again to provide a series of <u>computer science professional development</u> opportunities for Montana K-12 teachers during Summer 2022.

The plan is to offer four unique professional development opportunities in the Joy and Beauty of Computing (JBC), Mobile CSP, Python Modules, Game Programming and/or the Joy and Beauty of Data (JBD) during the summer of 2022. All classes are geared towards Montana high school and middle school teachers who would like to offer these courses in their local schools.

Python Modules: June 13-17, 2022; in-person only

Learn how to integrate modules that emphasize Python programming and computational thinking into high school science and math classes. Modules are fully developed and ready to go. They vary in length and difficulty. Opportunities to develop custom modules for your own classes will be provided and supported.

Joy and Beauty of Computing (JBC): June 13-17, 2022; in-person only

JBC (Joy and Beauty of Computing) offers students an overview of the world of computing, as well as a gentle introduction to computational thinking using the Python programming language. It examines the computing field and how it impacts the human condition and introduces exciting ideas and influential people.

Game Programming: Self-paced, Online

Game programming using Unity

Mobile CSP: Summer 2022, Online

Mobile CSP is based on the College Board's emerging Advanced Placement (AP) Computer Science Principles curriculum framework for introductory computer science. Students will learn computer science by building socially useful mobile apps. In addition to programming and computer science principles, the course is project-based and emphasizes writing, communication, collaboration, and creativity. TEAMS Opens for CTE Data Updates—Spring Enrollment Number Updates Due March 15

The Office of Public Instruction has opened the <u>Terms of Employment, Accreditation, and Master Schedule</u> (TEAMS) system to verify and update Career & Technical Education (CTE) enrollment for spring semester/trimester courses. TEAMS is open for enrollment updates thru March 15.

During the spring enrollment update, only the enrollment numbers for spring courses can be updated; additional courses cannot be added, and currently listed courses cannot be changed.

Please use this window to verify and updated spring enrollments, if necessary. The CTE enrolment data in TEAMS will be used to generate the CTE Participation Reports for the 2021-2022 school year as well as State CTE/VoEd funding allocations for the 2022-2023 school year.

Montana State CTE (VoEd) Funding & Perkins Intent to Apply for FY2023 Due March 15

The 2022-2023 Montana State CTE (VoEd) Funding is an allocation based on the 2021-2022 school year data entered in the Terms of Employment Accreditation and Master Schedules (TEAMS) and with Career and Technical Student Organization (CTSO's) State Directors' membership rosters.

The factors of allocation are approvable CTE Program(s), correct course codes for CTE courses, properly endorsed teacher, student enrollment numbers and minutes for each course, affiliated CTSO chapters and membership numbers, as well as any extended contract days for the CTE teacher.

All public high schools and K-12 districts with qualifying CTE Programs are eligible to <u>apply</u>. Elementary districts are not eligible.

Carl D. Perkins provides funding to strengthen the Career and Technical Education programs offered to students; helping them to explore careers in high wage, high skill, and in demand fields. There are 16 Montana Career Pathways that allow students to explore the areas of Agricultural Education, Business and Marketing Education, Family and Consumer Sciences, Health Science, and Industrial Technology Education. Courses and programs must be taught by instructors endorsed in the respective curricular area.

All public high schools and K-12 districts with qualifying CTE Programs are eligible to <u>apply</u>. Elementary districts are not eligible.

Apply Now for the Montana Quality Educator Loan Assistance Program

Through House Bill 211, the 2019 Montana legislature renewed the quality educator <u>student loan</u> <u>assistance</u> program as a recruitment and retention aid for rural schools. The Office of Public Instruction is responsible for administering the program. Applications for the <u>Montana Quality Educator Loan</u> <u>Assistance Program</u> will be accepted from February 1-March 31, 2022.

Newly hired quality educators who teach or work in a subject that has been identified as a "critical quality educator shortage area" at an "impacted school" are eligible to receive state paid loan assistance for up to four years, so long as they remain a full-time employee at an impacted school.

The <u>program</u> provides for up to \$3,000 of state-funded loan repayment at the end of the first year of teaching, up to \$4,000 at the end of the second year, and up to \$5,000 at the end of the third year. In addition, the school district has the option to offer up to \$5,000 at the end of the fourth year, but this is entirely a local decision.

Fun Facts & Trivia

In 1271, 17-year-old Marco Polo started on a journey to China with his father and older brother.

After a long and grueling journey that led through Jerusalem and Mesopotamia and over the "Silk Road", they reached the court of Kublai Khan in 1275.

In *The Voyages of Marco Polo*, players recreate this journey, with each player having a different character from history with a special power in the game.

The game is played over five rounds and in each round, the players roll their five personal dice and can perform one action each turn with them.

Each action requires the use of one or more dice, and can be collecting resources or money, acquiring contracts, or traveling on the board.

When traveling, each player begins at Venice and can decide between several routes eastward, all the way to Beijing.

When a player stops at a city, they place a trading post there, giving them access to extra actions or resources for the rest of the game.

The higher the value of the dice used for an action, the better the options that may be chosen, but also the more money the player must pay if an opponent has already chosen the same action.

After five rounds, the game ends with players receiving extra victory points for having trading posts in Beijing, fulfilling the most orders, and having trading posts in the cities on secret city cards that each player gets at the start of the game.

A Venetian merchant, Marco Polo's travels are recorded in *The Travels of Marco Polo*.

The book described to Europeans the then mysterious culture and inner workings of the Eastern world, including the wealth and great size of the Mongol Empire and China in the Yuan Dynasty, giving their first comprehensive look into China, Persia, India, Japan and other Asian cities and countries.

Kublai Khan, the grandson of great Mongol leader Genghis Khan, was impressed by Marco's intelligence and humility.

Marco was appointed to serve as Khan's foreign emissary, and he was sent on many diplomatic missions throughout the empire and Southeast Asia, such as in present-day Burma, India, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, and Vietnam.

As part of this appointment, Marco also travelled extensively inside China, living in the emperor's lands for 17 years and seeing many things that had previously been unknown to Europeans.

Though he was not the first European to reach China, Marco Polo was the first to leave a detailed chronicle of his experience.

His writings provided the Europeans with a clear picture of the East's geography and ethnic customs, and was the first Western record of porcelain, coal, gunpowder, paper money, and some Asian plants and exotic animals.

A form of tag often played in swimming pools is also known as Marco Polo.

The game shares similar traits with blind man's bluff, an essentially identical game played on dry land which dates back to at least the 16th century.

Marco Polo was known as a water game in America by the 1960s.

Between 1965 and 1970, some respondents to a *Dictionary of American Regional English* survey, when asked to name a game played in the water, responded with "Marco Polo".

By the mid-1970s, the game had spread and become very popular in swimming pools frequented by expatriates living in Hong Kong.

The game has featured in two episodes of *The Simpsons*—Oh Brother, Where Art Thou? (1991) and Little Big Mom (2000).

The game is played in the episode entitled Marco Polo of *The Sopranos* (2004), and the episode of the same name of *Modern Family* (2014).
