Download Montana Business Ed Curriculum Resources Updated for 2022-2023

Aviation-Focused STEM Workshop for Montana Teachers

On October 7 and 8, 2022, the Montana Aeronautics Division of the Department of Transportation will host its annual Teacher Workshop. The Division has partnered with the Montana Learning Center (MLC) at Canyon Ferry Lake to deliver the program and the curriculum is authorized to provide 20 renewal credits through the Office of Public Instruction. <u>Applications</u> are due September 15, 2022.

Teachers will receive instruction from Dr. Walter Woolbaugh of MSU, Ryan Hannahoe, Executive Director of the Learning Center, Chris Gillette, retired airline pilot and member of the MLC team, and Montana Aeronautics staff. The lessons will consist of aeronautics theory and principle-based demonstrations and experiments they can easily and affordably reproduce in the classroom for students. These ideas and experiments are designed to excite students about aviation while learning STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) principles that apply to everyday life. The goal of the workshop is for teachers to take their newfound passion for aviation and transfer it back to their students in their classrooms.

Introductory flights will kick-off the event along with tours of the Montana Air National Guard, an air ambulance operator, Helena College aircraft mechanic school, and the Helena Air Traffic Control Tower. On the second day, classroom activities and studies will take place at the Montana Learning Center.

Best of all, there is no cost to teachers.

2022-23 US Senate Youth Program Scholarships

The 2022-23 U.S. Senate Youth Program (USSYP) Scholarship application period opened on August 22, 2022, to Montana Juniors and Seniors who meet the <u>USSYP qualifications</u>.

Two students from Montana will be selected to receive one \$10,000 scholarship each, along with a required Washington Week Program, March 4-11, 2023. Attending the entire Washington Week public service and leadership program and the college scholarship are one, inseparable award.

TEAMS Virtual Work Sessions Scheduled for September and October

The Accreditation and Educator Preparation unit is offering <u>14 virtual work sessions</u> in September and October to assist with completing the Terms of Employment, Accreditation, and Master Schedule (TEAMS) report.

They are all via Zoom and you do not need to register beforehand. There are five (5) sessions intended for new users and nine (9) sessions for returning users that discuss FY2023 Updates.

Applications for 2022-2023 Perkins Rural Reserve Grants Now Open

Applications for the <u>Montana Perkins Secondary Rural Reserve Grant</u> can be submitted for the 2022-2023 grant cycle. The purpose of this year's <u>Montana Perkins Secondary Rural Reserve</u> grant is to create career awareness, recruit, and retain students within a CTE Secondary Program of Study that leads to a high skill, high wage, or in-demand occupations.

There are currently 176 schools offering over 260 Career and Technical Education courses to students in grades 5-8 in our Montana schools. The most offered course is in career exploration. Since Montana does not receive enough funding to allow us to provide Perkins funding for middle school programs this year's Rural Reserve Grant will be to encourage pathway work for the middle grades.

Schools could use the funds to help:

- --establish innovative delivery methods for career exploration
- --expose students to employability skills earlier
- --establish foundational elements for work-based learning
- --improve transitions from middle grades into secondary Career and Technical Education pathways.

<u>Grants</u> of up to \$5,000 each will be available to secondary Perkins eligible school districts to support CTE work in the middle grades (5-8). Schools will have had to complete the Perkins Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment (CLNA), and their E-Grant application must be approved for the 2022-2023 Grant cycle before applying.

Schools that were awarded in previous years are eligible to apply, however, preference will be given to new applicants. The 2022-2023 application can be downloaded from the <u>CTE page</u> of the OPI website under the Funding menu.

Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program

As an employee of a local public school system, you may qualify for the <u>Public Service Loan Forgiveness</u> (<u>PSLF</u>) <u>Program</u>. PSLF is a federal program that forgives the remaining balance on direct loans after 120 qualifying monthly payments under a qualifying repayment plan while an individual is working full-time for a qualifying employer.

Last year, the U.S. Department of Education announced a time-limited waiver to allow borrowers to receive credit for past periods of repayment that would otherwise not qualify for loan forgiveness. Under the temporary waiver, any prior period of repayment counts as a qualifying payment, regardless of loan program, repayment plan, or whether the payment was made in full or on time, provided the employment requirements are satisfied.

The waiver is only available for a limited time. The deadline to submit the <u>PSLF Application</u> for the waiver is October 31, 2022. Individual employees are responsible for submitting all necessary forms to the U.S. Department of Education. Requests for employment certification should be directed to campus human resources.

The course is open to Montana educators on a first-come, first-serve basis; however, scholarships for Montana educators are currently not available. The cost to complete the course is \$1500.

Fun Facts & Trivia

Disney' second animated feature film *Pinocchio* premiered in New York City on February 7, 1940.

Carlo Collodi was the pen name of Carlo Lorenzini, an Italian author, humorist, and journalist, who was widely known for his fairy tale novel *The Adventures of Pinocchio*.

The film required the talents of 750 artists, including animators, assistants, inbetweeners, layout artists, background painters, special-effects animators, and inkers and painters, who produced more than 2 million drawings and used some 1,500 shades of paint for the Technicolor production.

Pinocchio cost \$2.8 million to make, equivalent to over \$100 million today, and was one of the most expensive films produced at the time.

With the outbreak of war in Europe, the film did not make much money outside of the United States; therefore, taking years to earn a profit.

Jiminy Cricket became the film's most popular and enduring character, appearing in subsequent Disney films and television shows, including Fun and Fancy Free and the Mickey Mouse Club.

In Collodi's tale, Jiminy Cricket's role was only a minor one and was eventually squashed by Pinocchio.

The song "When You Wish Upon a Star" received the Academy Awards for Best Score and Best Song; the first Disney song to win an Oscar.

The song was sung by Cliff Edwards, who was also the voice of Jiminy Cricket.

"When You Wish Upon a Star" is widely considered as the signature song of The Walt Disney Company and is often used as such in the production logos at the beginning of many Disney films.

True fans of *Pinocchio* can visit Pinocchio Park.

Pinocchio Park is located in the Tuscany region of Italy in the town of Collodi.

Collodi is the town where Carlo Lorenzini spent the carefree years of his childhood together with his family, and which he loved so much that he chose to change his name to Carlo Collodi.

Opened in 1956, Pinocchio Park is the ideal place for a day with the family, where you can while away the hours surrounded by greenery, art and architecture and introduce your children to the Italian fairy tale beloved world-round.

The park includes the sculpture "Terrible Dogfish" by Augusto Piccoli which is a gigantic version of the famous whale that first swallows Geppetto and later Pinocchio.

Visitors can go inside and climb up to the top of the giant whale, where they can get a magnificent view of the whole park.

The Pinocchio's Daring Journey ride opened in Disneyland in 1983 as part of Disneyland's Fantasyland expansion.

Pinocchio's Daring Journey was the last dark ride built in Disneyland.
