# TEAMS Open March 1-15 for CTE Data Updates—Spring Enrollment Numbers

The Office of Public Instruction has opened the <u>Terms of Employment, Accreditation, and Master Schedule</u> (TEAMS) system to verify and update Career & Technical Education (CTE) enrollment for spring semester/trimester courses. TEAMS is open for enrollment updates thru March 15.

During the spring enrollment update, only the enrollment numbers for spring courses can be updated; additional courses cannot be added, and currently listed courses cannot be changed.

Also during this time, please double check extended contract days, if applicable, and make any updates if needed.

Please use this window to verify and update spring enrollments, if necessary. The CTE enrolment data in TEAMS will be used to generate the CTE Participation Reports for the 2022-2023 school year as well as State CTE/VoEd funding allocations for the 2023-2024 school year.

# Montana State CTE (Vo-Ed) Funding and Perkins Intent to Apply Due March 17

**Montana State CTE (Vo-Ed) Funding:** The 2023-2024 Montana State CTE (VoEd) Funding is an allocation based on the 2022-2023 school year data entered in the Terms of Employment Accreditation and Master Schedules (TEAMS) and with Career and Technical Student Organization (CTSO's) State Directors' membership rosters.

The factors of allocation are approvable CTE Program(s), correct course codes for CTE courses, properly endorsed teacher, student enrollment numbers and minutes for each course, affiliated CTSO chapters and membership numbers, as well as any extended contract days for the CTE teacher.

All high schools and K-12 districts with qualifying CTE Programs are eligible to apply.

**Carl D. Perkins funding:** Carl D. Perkins provides funding to strengthen the Career and Technical Education programs offered to students; helping them to explore careers in high-wage, high-skill, and in-demand fields. There are 16 Montana Career Pathways that allow students to explore the areas of Agricultural Education, Business and Marketing Education, Family and Consumer Sciences, Health Science, and Industrial Technology Education. Courses and programs must be taught by instructors endorsed in the respective curricular area.

All high schools and K-12 districts with qualifying CTE Programs are eligible to apply.

The Intent to Apply Google Form must be completed by March 17, 2023.

## Applications Now Being Accepted for Montana Quality Educator Loan Assistance Program

Through HB 211, the 2019 Montana legislature renewed the <u>quality educator loan assistance program</u> as a recruitment and retention aid for rural schools. The OPI is responsible for administering the program.

Newly hired quality educators who teach or work in a subject that has been identified as a "critical quality educator shortage area" at an "impacted school" are eligible to receive state paid loan assistance for up to four years, so long as they remain a full time employee at an impacted school.

The Office of Public Instruction has updated the process for <u>Quality Educator Loan Assistance Program applications</u>. The application process opened February 13, 2023, and runs through April 14, 2023.

Use the <u>application link</u> to complete an application and upload required documents. Please note that approvals and payments will not be processed until the review process is complete for all applications. Expect payment to be sent out after June 1, 2023. Letters to applicants will be sent at the same time.

Every year, the Montana Council for Economic Education (MCEE), with support from the National Council for Economic Education hosts the Montana Personal Finance Challenge. The challenge is an opportunity for students to demonstrate their knowledge of personal finance by connecting with other students from across the state in an online competition.

**How does the challenge work?** Teams of 3-4 students will have 35 minutes to complete a 30-question online exam covering the principles of personal finance including money management, credit, investing, and insurance. Testing must be completed by April 5, 2023. Sample tests are available in the program.

Students earn 10 points for every correct response and 0 points for each incorrect answer. Every question must be answered to move on, and students are not able to go back to previous questions.

#### **Fun Facts & Trivia**

In the Disney film, *The Rescuers*, The Rescue Aid Society, an international organization of mice with headquarters in the basement of the United Nations building, receives a plea for help from a little orphan girl named Penny.

Penny has been kidnapped by an evil woman, Madame Medusa, who intends to use her to retrieve a fabulous diamond, the Devil's Eye, from a pirate cave.

The case is taken by lovely Bianca and Rescue Aid Society custodian Bernard, who becomes her shy assistant.

Together, after avoiding two brutish alligators, enlisting the help of the local swamp folk, and turning Medusa and her henchman Snoops against themselves, they rescue Penny and the diamond.

The Rescuers was Released on June 22, 1977.

The Rescuers featured the voices of Eva Gabor (Bianca) and Bob Newhart (Bernard) along with Geraldine Page (Madame Medusa), Jim Jordan (Orville), John McIntire (Rufus), James Macdonald (Evinrude), Michelle Stacy (Penny), Bernard Fox (Chairmouse), Larry Clemmons (Gramps), George Lindsey (Deadeye), Dub Taylor (Digger), John Fiedler (Deacon), and Pat Buttram (Luke).

The animated film was based on two books by Margery Sharp: The Rescuers and Miss Bianca.

The film was nominated for an Academy Award for "Someone's Waiting For You," as Best Song, written by Sammy Fain, Carol Connors, and Ayn Robbins.

The film was four years in the making, with the combined talents of 250 people, including 40 animators who produced approximately 330,000 drawings; there were 14 sequences with 1,039 separate scenes and 750 backgrounds.

The Rescuers Down Under was the first Disney animated classic essentially to be a sequel, to the 1977 hit film, The Rescuers, when released on November 16, 1990.

In Australia, the young Cody discovers that evil Percival McLeach has captured the magnificent eagle, Marahute.

He manages to set her free only to be kidnapped himself, and later to see her recaptured.

A frantic call for help goes out to the Rescue Aid Society, which sends the intrepid Bernard and Miss Bianca to help.

They are aided by Wilbur from Albatross Air Lines, and in Australia are joined by Jake and frill-necked lizard Frank, in trying to outwit McLeach and save Marahute.

The Rescuers Down Under features the voice talents of Bob Newhart (Bernard), Eva Gabor (Bianca), John Candy (Wilbur), Tristan Rogers (Jake), Adam Ryen (Cody), and George C. Scott (Percival McLeach).

The production required a team of more than 415 artists and technicians.

Five key members of the creative team traveled to the Australian Outback to observe for themselves its unique beauty, which they wanted to capture on film.

They came home with hundreds of photographs of Ayers Rock, Katherine Gorge, and Kakadu National Park, and countless filled sketchbooks.

Since Jim Jordan, who had voiced the albatross Orville in the original *The Rescuers*, had passed away, it was Roy E. Disney who suggested the character of Wilbur, Orville's brother, as a replacement.

The names, of course, were a play on the Wright Brothers.

While the animation itself would be done by hand as it always has been, for the first time, computer technology took the place of the Xerox process and the hand painting of cels (and it also enabled the inclusion of several spectacular visuals).

The marketing effort for the film did not call attention to the fact that cels were not used, so that the film would be reviewed on its own merits and not in comparison to earlier Disney films.
